

According to the February 2021 World Food Programme's Caribbean COVID-19 Food Security & Livelihoods report, the total number of people in the region currently estimated as food insecure represents an increase of 57% compared to April 2020. This spike, along with other recent and ongoing crises in the Caribbean – including increased natural disasters and the COVID-19 pandemic – underscore the need for more community-driven approaches to build local capacity to best navigate these challenging situations. Trees have historically been a reliable resource for communities to provide food, water filtration, medicine, and other basic necessities, while creating self-sustaining and reliable livelihood opportunities. During this virtual session, participants better understood how trees are being leveraged not only to reverse climate change, and are also a global solution to strengthen food security, encourage sustainable farming, restore coastlines, and promote economic empowerment. Participants got an opportunity to share knowledge, build new partnerships, and network with other partners to identify collaboration opportunities to bolster resilience and promote solidarity through tree planting around the world.

On World Environment Day, June 5, 2021 we held a CTPP Milestone Event and announced our collaboration with Alba of Denmark.

In response to the earthquake that struck Haiti on August 14, 2021, we collaborated with Trees that Feed Foundation to HELP HAITIANS HELP THEMSELVES!!!

HELP HAITIANS HELP THEMSELVES!!!

In the midst of another devastation in Haiti after a magnitude 7.2 earthquake struck near Les Cayes, Jérémie and other areas of Southwest Haiti, there is a ray of hope!!!

Since 2011, **Trees That Feed Foundation (TTFF)** has worked closely with organizations and individuals in the affected areas of Haiti, primarily in planting breadfruit trees and creating breadfruit by-products. Their local partners, **Jérémie Breadfruit Flour and Nursery (JBFN)**, produces breadfruit flour, breadfruit konparèts (a nutritious biscuit made with breadfruit flour), breadfruit breads and fruit tree seedlings. JBFN produces thousands of konparèts every month for schools and orphanages supported by TTFF, as well as other customers. They also empower women by offering cooking classes using breadfruit flour and encouraging them to become entrepreneurs and start their own business.

In response to this recent crisis, JBFN have donated their entire stock of konparèts to local families in distress. Although damaged, their bakery is still operational and they want to immediately ramp up production to assist families, schools, orphanages and others in need. According to JBFN owner, Pierre-Moise Louis:

"We are focusing on konparèts because it is very nutritious and ready to eat so people don't need to cook. People in Jérémie are living on the streets now because their houses were destroyed and, because of the aftershocks of the earthquake, they are afraid to enter the rest of houses which are not still solid. They don't have any food and water so they need ready-to-eat foods because they don't have kitchens to cook."

This is GOODNEWS in the midst of this tragedy!!! Haitians are able to create local food solutions and help each other in this crisis. With assistance they can do much more!

TTFF is a major partner in the Caribbean Tree Planting Project (CTPP) being executed in 22 Caribbean countries and territories by the Caribbean Philanthropic Alliance (CariPhilAlliance). The CTPP has planted more than 1.5 million trees across the Caribbean, mainly in Haiti, since February 2020. The CariPhilAlliance fully supports the tree planting and related initiatives of TTFF in Haiti and is collaborating with TTFF in facilitating the expansion of konparèts production and related activities by JBFN.

Breadfruit is one of the most climate-resilient fruit in the Caribbean. By supporting the production capacity of JBFN, you not only immediately feed Haitians who are hungry, but also help to strengthen food security, build Haitian resilience, empower Haitians to help themselves, and contribute to sustainable development in Haiti.

We got the inspiration for the print from a video shared with us from St. Kitts and Nevis, which highlights the islands' oldest tree, a 400-year-old baobab tree.

Baobab trees have a significant meaning for the region as it is one of the sacred trees of the Caribbean. The baobab tree, or as people call it "tree of life", is a symbol of power, longevity, presence, strength, grace, life, and lots more.

By choosing this gigantic and well-respected tree as the print for this special collection, we aim to spread the message of unity and raise awareness around the importance of tree planting, not just in the Caribbean but all around the world.

Trees that Feed Foundation

The Trees That Feed Foundation (TTFF) mission is to plant fruit trees, to feed people, create jobs, educate and benefit the environment. The Foundation ensures that fruit trees are planted and are kept alive to feed people and delivers relevant education to ensure farmers and other beneficiaries become self-sufficient.

The TTFF is a successful evidenced-based model for the Caribbean which has successfully planted over 61,000 fruit trees in 2021, benefiting tens of thousands of farmers and their families and communities across the Caribbean including global communities in Africa.

The TTFF recognizes that fruit trees are inherently more expensive initially than timber trees, however the payback is enormously greater. After 3 or 4 years with minimal care, the tree begins to produce 150 – 250 fruits annually. The fruit can be sold at the farm gate or to processors. The marketplaces are local with the potential for export of nutritious, gluten free breadfruit and other by-products.

Mary McLaughlin, the co-founder, spends time offering advice to Caribbean Tree Planting Ambassadors, and shares strategies and key learnings on how to leverage tree planting to lift women out of poverty. For example, in Haiti, the TTFF works with women to use Breadfruit flour to make konparèts, delicious hard biscuits for sale. Women use earnings to feed their families and savings to buy additional Koperets or to use for a rainy day.

The TTFF financial resilience strategy has also influenced the development of a WE CARE programme to be launched in 2022.


While Trees That Feed Foundation is small by USA standards, they operate in 18 tropical countries with a global footprint that shares a message that they are more than just planting trees.
